Community Chorus to debut new director at spring concert

The Siuslaw High School Chamber Choir, the Encore Dancers, CROW Kids and the Flotones will all be special guest performers at the May 1 Community Chorus of Florence performance. The spring concert, titled "Irving Berlin Meets Uncle Sam," will include a number of patriotic songs as well as old favorites that people enjoy singing or humming along with. Irving Berlin wrote hundreds of songs, many becoming major hits, which made him a "legend" before he turned 30.

During his 60-year career, Berlin wrote an estimated 1,500 songs, including the scores for 19 Broadway shows and 18 Hollywood films, with his songs nominated eight times for Academy Awards.

The concert will be held Sunday, May 1, beginning at 2 p.m. at the Florence Events Center.

Tickets are \$10 for adults, with attendees age 18 and younger admitted free.

In addition, new Community Chorus of Florence director Jennifer Weier will make her debut during the spring concert. Having moved to Florence in December of 2015, Weier quickly became enmeshed in the local music scene. In addition to directing the Chorus, Weier, an accomplished pianist, also provides accompaniment for local church choirs and the Flotones.

She also teaches piano and has a number of students.

Since beginning her piano studies at age 4, Weier progressed to the point of graduating with a piano performance degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. She has performed internationally and is planning to complete a master's degree in piano performance in Germany at some time in the future.

Despite her busy volunteer and conducting schedule, Weier

tries to practice piano for five hours a day. She manages to fit in hobbies such as hiking, running and cooking.

'Dancing Sea Lions' celebration makes big splash

More than 750 people were in attendance for the official "Splash Off" of the FEC's Dancing With Sea Lions reveal, which is part of the center's 20th anniversary celebration. The project is a public art program featuring 20 hand-decorated fiberglass sea lions on display from Reedsport to Newport and locations throughout Florence.

On April 8, the FEC held an artist reception for the Dancing with Sea Lions artists, committee members, sponsors, underwriters and the Friends of the FEC before the free public Splash Off! event April 9.

Jennifer Connor, FEC marketing specialist and project coordinator, said she loved that the project makes art accessible.

"I keep going back to our original theme, that the arts have a ripple effect on the community. Art reaches out to all ages, and this project will reach out to all ages too," Connor said.

FEC Director Kevin Rhodes opened the artist reception, where all 20 full-sized sea





lions filled the flat floor of the events center. Rhodes said the FEC continues to host local and regional events. By the end of this year, the tally will total 8,000 events.

"Although the celebration continues throughout the year, Dancing with Sea Lions is certainly the pinnacle event. Jennifer and the whole committee has done a fantastic job," Rhodes said.

Each Dancing with Sea Lions sculpture was sponsored by an area business or organization. The project was underwritten by Sea Lion Caves, Florence Urban Renewal Agency and Three Rivers Casino Resort. City Councilor Joshua Greene, who is also active in the Public Arts Committee and Florence Urban Renewal Agency, said, "When you think about the FEC and all that Jennifer and her team have done to get this done and get it out there from Newport to Reedsport, this is really terrific. You come in here and you see this unbelievable expression of creativity, fun and excitement, and all by these artists in our community."

Royal court takes center stage for Rhody Showcase May 11



The annual Rhododendron Festival is Florence's premiere event, bringing more than 10,000 people to this small, coastal town for four days of celebration. But before the vendors, bikers and parades fill the streets, the Rhody Court take to the stage for the Rhododendron Court Scholarship Showcase to determine this year's royalty.

Once known as the Rhododendron Pageant and now held in advance of the annual Rhododendron Festival, the event features local high school juniors and seniors who will compete for scholarships and title of Queen Rhododendra during Rhododendron Days.

The showcase will be Wednesday, May 11, at 6:30 p.m., at the Florence Events Center, along with video presentations, displays of talent, dance numbers and live interviews of the princesses.

In addition, a junior court of five princesses and five princes will represent grades 1 through 5.

For the past several weeks, members of the Senior Rhody Court and Junior Princesses have been serving as ambassadors for the festival by visiting senior residences, volunteering in the community and, most recently, rehearsing their talents for the fun-filled Rhody Showcase.

Court members will be judged individually on participation, mentorship, public speaking and platform presentation, pin sales and talent.

Queen Rhododendra will be crowned at the end of the showcase, and both courts will make appearances in the the Kids Parade and Grand Floral Parade during the 109th Rhododendron Festival, May 19 through 22.

Spoken Word poets have a chance to shine with rhyme

Get your rhyme on May 7, during the Big Wave Spoken Word Poetry Slam and Contest taking place at 6 p.m. at the Florence Events Center. Florence Regional Arts Alliance (FRAA) is the organizer of this statewide event, which is offering the largest cash prizes in Oregon.

The first place winner will receive \$500, along with \$250 for second place and \$100 for third.

Poetry slams were invented in the late 80's in Chicago as a way of breathing new life into open-mic poetry events. The audience is involved, not only because the five judges are chosen randomly from the audience, but also because audience members are encouraged to verbalize or otherwise indicate their appreciate or dissatisfaction with the judges scoring.

Finger snapping indicates the poet has said something that resonates with the audience. Booing of scores that are deemed too low, and wild clapping and whistling for those brave poets who bare their souls, are common.

Poetry slams attract a wide range of poets and diverse subject matter, including heartfelt love poetry, searing social commentary, comedic routines, and bittersweet personal stories.

Poets are free to perform any style.

"If you have never been to a Spoken Word Poetry contest," says chairwoman Bettie Egerton, "this is the one to attend. We will have the best of the best, from all around Oregon. You will laugh, cry, snap your fingers in appreciation and be emotionally transformed by the poetry you hear."

Admission to the event is \$10, which supports FRAA Poetry Events and the Youth Poetry Program.

A special youth poetry contest will be held at 2 p.m., with the winner receiving \$100, \$50 for second place and \$25 for third place.

DanceAbility brings eclectic dance to Florence



"Don't Leave Me" is an enthralling modern dance performance that celebrates creativity and the potential that is only possible when people with and without disabilities



work together as equals. This is the first professional mixed-abilities performance to ever be shown in Florence. It is also the first time that DanceAbility International will

perform in Florence.

"Don't Leave Me" is being presented by the DanceAbility international dance company, in collaboration with the University of Oregon School of Architecture, which designed the set structures. The show explores how we are all dependent on each other and how space determines action and vice versa. The dancers use the ever-changing set design as apparel, as furniture and as architecture. The human and architectural bodies act as a symbiotic community.

This cross-discipline collaboration of dance and architecture takes risks with frames and bodies. During a rehearsal, one of the dancers was high up on the designed structure and felt it start to shake. She immediately called out to the dancers below her "don't leave me!"

This became the title of the piece.

It speaks to our interdependence and also the DanceAbility method belief that nobody should be left out or left behind.

This performance will open audience's hearts and minds. It shows the unlimited potential of people when disabilities are not viewed as something inferior. The dancers with and without disabilities create and express together as equals.

DanceAbility International performances surprise and delight, as they dissolve labels and barriers.

This project is made possible in part by Western Lane Community Foundation, Plum Creek Foundation, and Lane County Cultural Coalition, with operating support from Lane Arts Council and Oregon Arts Commission.

"Don't Leave Me" will be performed at the Florence Events Center June 10, at 7 p.m. Tickets are \$22.

FEC offering artists many exhibit opportunities ahead

March and April will be a patriotic themed exhibit, with a reception benefiting DAV and the Military Heritage Museum.
